

For those who take a deeper interest in the resolutions, here is a message from NFWI:

Resolution amendments and urgencies.

To allow members more time, the deadline for members to submit urgency resolutions and amendments only to the NFWI has been pushed back to **9** April.

Any proposed urgency resolutions and suggested amendments from WIs and Federations will be considered by the NFWI Board of Trustees and can be emailed directly to the NFWI Public Affairs Department at <u>pa@nfwi.org.uk</u>.

Please note that proposed amendments must not materially change a resolution. Amendments should enhance a resolution, whilst retaining the original objective. (An 'urgency resolution' is a resolution submitted after the closing date for submissions for inclusion in the agenda of an Annual Meeting of the NFWI. An urgency resolution deals with a development arising after that date, and which requires action to be taken at once to be effective.)

The vote on the resolution/s for the 2020/21 process will remain after the Annual Meeting as planned. WIs will have time before and after the Annual Meeting in June to consider how they wish to vote, and a deadline for WIs to cast their votes online will be circulated in due course, followed by guidance on how to do this later in the year.

STAR GAZING

Alison Fremantle, Science & Leisure For many thousands of years, our ancestors have been star gazing out of a natural curiosity for the heavenly bodies

in our skies, and to make sense of their existence.

Trying to understand our place in the cosmos has led to amazing astronomical discoveries and has inspired generations of painters, musicians and literary artists. Discovery by the Ancient Greeks and Chinese of the Zodiac – a Greek word meaning 'circle of animals' has led to the telling of stories, and being able to determine the time of year.

The zodiac constellations lie along the path of the sun and sailors have been guided by them in their exploration of the globe, farmers have used the annual rhythms of stars to influence agriculture.

Today the Zodiac is mostly associated with Astrology – and many of us enjoy 'reading our stars' daily in the newspaper!

There are quite a few astronomical clubs and societies around the internet. I don't expect they are meeting under present (pandemic) conditions, but I think it may be interesting to check out some of them one day. One of them, The West of

cloudy).


Of course we have light pollution over London, but in countryside locations, where there are no lights, or out at sea, you can see so much more.

CHANGE STARTS HERE: CAN WE COUNT YOU IN?

It's been a strange few months but the WI will survive in spite of everything, and we will all once again meet in person, hug our families and friends, and look back on these strange times, perhaps not with fondness, but with gratitude we have come out the other side.

Many WIs have been unable to hold their Annual Meeting and recruit volunteers to join the Committee. It is the Committee which is responsible for running your WI and devising its programme of events and activities. Each Committee is made up of members who act as trustees of the WI.

The main role of the Committee is to:

- meet regularly to discuss WI business (at least six times a year) and keep minutes of these meetings
- organise meetings and activities for members
- stay up to date with the Middlesex Federation and NFWI and feed back to members
- suggest policy and plans of action to members for approval
- oversee the funds of the WI.

Committee Roles

President - responsible for the overall running, elected by the members

The other roles are elected by the Committee:

- Vice President(s) (up to three) supports the President and shares some of her responsibilities;
- Secretary ensures Committee business is carried out;
- Treasurer oversees the WI's accounts and gives financial advice to Committee.

Your WI needs Committee members with diverse skills and talents to remain successful. Why not ask your secretary if you observe a Committee meeting in action.

Members elect a new Committee each vear at their Annual Meeting. It should include at least three Committee

members, of whom one is chosen as president.

A special Committee meeting should then be held as soon as possible after the Annual Meeting to elect the officers and attend to other urgent business.

Dual (or more) members who belong to more than one WI can stand for election at their dual WIs pending the adoption of a byelaw to permit this. The Committee may also co-opt members for specific duties. Any vacancy which occurs during the WI year may be filled by co-option until the WI's next Annual Meeting.

WHAT THREE WORDS

Have you heard about 'What 3 Words'?

It is a free app available for anyone with a smartphone, and can also be accessed via the website https://what3words.com. It's a 'locator app' which will help you locate anything, anywhere without a traditional map.

The designers have divided the world up into 3 metre x 3 metre areas and given each area three unique words. For instance, Middlesex Federation Office is **liability.likely.lease**. Buckingham Palace is **fence.gross.bats!**

As you can see they are not words connected to the addresses in anyway but easy to inform others of a location.

Upon opening the app it will give you a simple three word reference of your exact location.

It is used by our emergency services to locate those that need assistance and has many other uses.

Here are just a few non-urgent ones that I have found very useful:

Locating my car in a large carpark – I
just saved the words, it took me
straight back to my car.

- Finding spouse in a large supermarket (much easier than 'I am in the baked bean aisle!')
- Meeting friends in a country park
- When I can't find a street sign

It is one of those apps that you may only use once in a while but it is well worth having on your phone.
