The two stylish founders of sustainable fashion shop, Come Swap & Shop in Hornsey, Georgie and Teri McKenzie, talked passionately about their shop and what had inspired them to set it up. They told us how we could update our wardrobes every month in a costeffective and sustainable way.



They outlined eight tips for cutting down on clothing going into landfill:

- wear what you own a lot
- take care of clothes: mend, clean and restore clothes;
- swap clothing with friends and family;
- sell unwanted items on retail platforms; buy second-hand clothes;
- buy quality items that will last a long time;
- support clothing brands that recycle clothes;
- rent occasion wear such as party and wedding outfits.

Our second speaker, Liz Ixer, explained how the Railway Fields Nature Reserve, in Harringay, had evolved from a disused railway goods yard into a Green Flag award winning environment with 21 species of birds. The reserve has its own unique species, the Haringey vine, which is a cross between Japanese knotweed and Russian vine.

Bought by Haringey Council in 1975, the reserve provides local primary schools with environmental sessions to help children engage with plants and animals and enjoy spending time in nature. 


A Buckinghamshire Science Day Out

On a bright spring day I drove to Aylesbury for a *Day of Investigation and Discovery* put on by Buckinghamshire Federation. What a marvellous day!

There were four speakers, all experts in their own fields. I was swamped with very interesting information—I just lapped it up!



taking the carbon emissions back to be stored underground safely. The aim is that by 2050, we will all be using hydrogen to replace gas.

A Life in Astrophysics was presented by Dame Jocelyn Bell Burnell, an astrophysicist who discovered the first radio pulsars in 1967. This discovery earned the Nobel Prize in 1974; however, she was not one of the prize recipients. She was the only woman studying a degree in Physics at Glasgow University and had to fight for recognition throughout her student career.

Robotics and Artificial Intelligence

was about automated and autonomous robotic development. Automated robots are widely used for manufacture and surgery among other things, but autonomous robots such as driverless cars are only in the early stages of development.

Rebel Cell: Aspects of Cancer was all about the cells in our bodies which mutate to escape our immune systems and cause cancers. Research has led to discovery that some rebel cells can be controlled, and

unfortunately they soon learn to reinvent themselves.

The speakers were excellent at presenting ladies. They had all been heard on Radio 4, were contacted by the team and 'interviewed' to make sure that they could present their topics in a way that we would understand.

As Science Representative, I will try to organise something similar for us in Middlesex. So watch this space!

Marking World Health Day 7 April 2022

This is the day celebrated globally to raise awareness and causes of climate change, affecting poor diet and health. This year's theme was 'Our planet, Our

Health', and focussed attention on urgent actions to keep all humans and the planet healthy and to create societies and organisations to achieve this

goal.



World Health Day centres on the link between the health of the planet, and the health of humans, animals and plants. WHO is calling on everyone to imagine a world with clean air, water and food available to all, and where healthy, people centred cities, villages and communities create conditions for people to lead better lives.

The WHO estimates that thirteen million deaths around the world are due to avoidable environmental issues. This includes the climate crisis which is the simple biggest health threat facing us, ie

climate crisis is health crisis. It also estimates that ninety percent of people breathe polluted air. Warmer climates are having a catastrophic effect on natural occurrences such as floods, wild fires and disease.

We can also be responsible for our own well-being, and the careful use of utilities to reduce energy use. We can also continue to be responsible for our own health and well-being by leading a healthy lifestyle to include a healthy diet, enough sleep and exercise.
