

Canapes, cakes and coffees were served, and we donated our record breaking raffle funds to Women Supporting Women.

We were delighted to welcome Munira Wilson MP for Twickenham as our guest speaker. She spoke passionately of the women who had supported her through education, her work in the charity sector and pharmaceutical industry, and within local politics as a Councillor and national politics as an MP.



We heard how she in turn has coached and encouraged younger women within these organisations, enabling them to fulfil their potential. Munira challenged all of us to help and encourage other young women and share the benefits of our life experiences.

We talked with her on our WI National Resolution Women and Girls with ASD and ADHD and hope to share further information with her on this in the future. A wide ranging Q+A session sought her response to accessibility, quality and provision of help in the care sector; the possibility of local housing for refugees; what happens in the surgeries she holds for her constituents; how Students could be assisted with the increased costs in heating; with our third female Prime Minister in Downing Street (at time of writing) what Munira's views were on what the PM was doing to support the women of the UK; her ambitions to raise money for two local children's charities; and dear to this writer's heart, how and why is the block of British butter I buy now priced 153% higher than it was this time last year.

At an extremely volatile time in the British political landscape, it was exceptionally kind of her to offer her time, observations and encouragement to our membership.
