At our 15 November meeting we had the pleasure of being entertained by opera singer Helen Astrid who, along with the assistance of some slides and videos, gave us a short history of Christmas carols and events over the centuries.

The first nativity play was instigated by Francis of Assisi in the 12th century, and is now a firm part of the Christmas festivities. Most European countries having their own versions of carols we know and love, with the exception of France, where there is less enthusiasm for them.

Our first video was of the wonderful choir of Kings College, Cambridge, with their rendition of *Silent Night*, which was composed in 1893 in a small Austrian chapel.

Also, the words of *In the Bleak Midwinter* were written by Christina Rossetti, wife of the

famous painter. Many famous people were inspired to write lyrics to their favourite melodies.

Unfortunately, all forms of Christmas enjoyment were cancelled during the Cromwell period but resumed when Charles II returned following the end of the Civil War.

The honour of the first Christmas broadcast by the BBC was awarded to the wonderful Truro Cathedral.

Hearing the many familiar carols, we were then issued with song sheets and enjoyed being an impromptu choir as a prelude to the festive season, the dim lighting adding to the atmosphere...

Our 100 year history 1922-2022

Lady Domville was the first president of Halliford WI, in 1922. It was very formal then and members were all addressed by their surnames. 'For Home and Country' was the slogan, with emphasis on the home, craft, 'make do and mend', how to darn stockings, jam making etc.

They befriended a ward of patients at St Bernard's hospital, taking gifts and arranging tea parties for them.

They also organised jumble sales, dances and parties for local people, held Produce and Handicraft shows where the members showed off their various skills and won silver cups.

During the war they knitted socks, balaclavas and scarves for the troops.

Later the WI slogan became 'The WI - inspiring women'.

We had a drama group, keep fit and whist evenings and took part in the Shepperton Fair parade, and pantomimes with other local WIs.

In 2000 we had a bench installed next to the bus stop near to the hall where we meet in Halliford, to celebrate the new Millennium.

We've had stalls at the May Fair on Halliford Green and Shepperton Fair, and raised money towards the defibrillator at St Andrew's Church.





In 2018 we were part of the Hundred Banners Project, celebrating the centenary of the suffragette movement. We made our banner, with the slogan 'Supporting the Community since 1922' and marched through London to the rally in Trafalgar Square.

During the Covid lockdowns we were unable



to meet in our hall so we started a weekly 'picnic in the park' and a local walk, all suitably spaced and masked.

Nowadays we have lunches, walks, cinema visits, whist drives, craft sessions and 'picnics in the park', as well as our monthly meetings.

We are celebrating our centenary year with special outings, afternoon tea at a hotel and recently a party and tree planting on Halliford Green.

The most important part of Halliford WI is the friendship between our members and always looking out for each.

the whole process was, nor that the dog was looked after for life. A most interesting talk!

October was very entertaining and humorous; we hosted Russell Bowls 'Dig for victory' with lots of slides. His story starting in 1939 when it was realised food from abroad would be in short supply. In those early days all gardens, parks and every other green area was made into vegetable growing places.

It not generally known that the WI had a big influence in recruiting girls for the Land Army who keep producing an enormous amount of

our food all through the war and until well into the '50s.

The October meeting was also the AGM when we were told our President Susan Whitworth who had held the position for 8 years plus was leaving to relocate in Northumbria. Susan has been a very popular president and will be greatly missed. On a more cheery note, Jackie Mayall was voted in overwhelmingly as our new President.

We have had a really busy month. At the end of October we visited the Battle of Britain Bunker in Uxbridge, an amazing historic place, many of us going for the first time, despite living in the area for many years.

The underground Operation Room, reached by 76 steps, housed the RAF Fighter Command's No 11 Group where so many decisions and ultimately the defence and fate of Britain in the Second World were made.

Sir Winston Churchill said his famous phase "Never in the field of human conflict was so





much owed by so many to so few," following a visit to the bunker. The Operations Room was set up as it was on 15 September 1940 and our tour guide Andy gave us an informative talk, a real insight on how the

plotting room worked and decisions were made.

The Woman's Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF) (80% were women at the bunker) were trained and played an important role as plotters, keeping track of what was happening in the air as part of the Dowding System. Well worth a visit.

For those unable to climb the 76 stairs there is also disabled access, a virtual tour, and there is a museum and café.

Our November meeting was a relaxed cheese and biscuit, tea and wine evening. A lovely collection of wood items were entered into our pennies theme for charity. We had lots of fun with our Chinese raffle—the bottle of Prosecco must have changed hands about 30 times!

Many of our ladies knitted and crocheted poppies and together with our Memory Tree they were displayed in the window of Lodge Brothers in Ruislip Gardens. Lorraine laid a wreath on behalf of the Ruislip Evening WI at the Ruislip Memorial Service Parade held on Sunday 13 November.

We will always remember those who gave their lives for us.

Centenary Recipes

For Middlesex Federation's centenary we asked members to contribute their favourite recipes for compilation and sharing among our members.

We continue this month with a recipe the presentation of which is so evocative we decided to leave it in its original format. Thank you to Ellen Young of Harlington WI for this submission.

Lemonade Scones

440g SR flour

175ml double cream (full fat)
175ml lemonade (not diet)

Mix all ingredients to make a dough, being careful not to overwork the dough.

Tip out onto a floured surface, and press to a 2cm thickness, and cut into rounds.

Place on a greased and floured baking tray. Heat oven to 220C (200fan; Gas mark 7).

Bake for 12-15 mins until golden.

Retained EU Law (Revocation and Reform) Bill

This bill was introduced in September to make it easier to amend, repeal and replace EU-derived laws that have remained on the UK's statute books following Brexit.

There are concerns that the government will have to actively develop new laws in order to replace the current laws before a tight deadline (31 Dec.2023) if this bill is passed as it stands.
