

As we walked into the hall for our July meeting we were greeted with the wonderful scent of fresh coffee. We tasted coffee freshly made from roasted beans and had an excellent, informative talk from Duncan and his wife who run Bay Coffee Roasters, a family company established over ten years ago, and which has won awards. They are based near the beach at Tresaith, West Wales. Their aim is to source Arabica beans which require longer growing times and specific climates.

The raw beans come from countries which include Brazil, Kenya, Ethiopia, Colombia, Honduras, and Papua New Guinea – we can't grow coffee beans in our climate! The beans are roasted and packaged in Wales, sold locally and on line, using a sustainability policy for their production and methods which are good for the climate: these include the use no fossil fuels, renewable electric energy and locally produced recyclable bags. Duncan also kindly gave us a bag of coffee to take home with us.

Lesley provided a fun quiz and delicious gluten free cake and our pennies competition theme was purple.

Our 'Thank you for being a friend' singalong and picnic was held in grounds of St Marys Church in Northolt. Some of us might not be able to sing but we had an enjoyable afternoon and the finished recording sounded great.

Our book club read Where the Crawdads Sing, a beautiful descriptive, well written book set in the marshlands of Barkley Cove in North Carolina; we will have lots to discuss at our next meeting.

On 28 June, we visited the Martinware Pottery Exhibition at Southall Library. The Victorian Martin family produced four of the best potters of their generation, experts in quirky and unique designs in ceramics and earthenware. As the Martins were local respected figures, they are buried in Southall Cemetery. There are also exhibitions of their work in other museums around the country.

We then went on a tour of the Gurdwara Sikh Temple, also in Southall, an amazing building, with a Main Hall holding up to 2000 people. Our guide gave us the history of the Sikh religion which was founded in the 1400s. It is based on kindness and care for every living thing, as well as cleanliness and tolerance of other religions. We then went to the huge kitchens where up to 10,000 meals per day are prepared by an army of staff and served to anyone who enters their doors, including the needy or homeless. We were then served the meal of the day: two curries, rice, a chapati, coconut sweet and a cup of tea.

On Saturday 9 July, the Springhallows Fair took place. This was an event with 25 stalls, in aid of the Springhallows School for Autistic Children. We had a stall selling tea towels and bags depicting local Greenford and Perivale landmarks, designed by our President Madelyn Rosario. The event was very well attended and towards the end of the day, Steven Pound, past Ealing MP, was kind enough to boost our coffers with a purchase. The day raised much needed funds and drew to a close just before the rains came. A very lively and productive day for the area.
