RJFP run a 'pay as you feel' café and food surplus hubs, along with home delivery food packs throughout our Borough five days a week, powered by volunteers, including some of our members. Supermarkets, the public and local food businesses donate surplus food. On a daily basis café menus are created to use that day's donations in hot nutritious meals. The very efficient part of their work is the that the RIFP receive food from, and donate food to, other food distribution charities, at a very local level, to use all food donations well. It is a daily dynamic food chain - literally. This demands a huge amount of dedication, long hours, and detailed management, which is greatly supported and appreciated by all of our local community.

TWI has started a Walking Group, and last week we ended our walk at The Real Junk Food Project Café, and enjoyed a lovely lunch, in their very friendly company.




# O Questions with... Angela Chessman
