Thin and thick lines, flourishes and twirls in shiny black ink flowed across writing pads as members tried out the calligraphy skills demonstrated by local artist Anthea of Crouch End Calligraphy. Hard pressure created thicker down strokes and less pressure thinner lines on upstrokes to create stylish lettering for cards, letters, menus, and place cards.

Members heard that there are different pen nibs for different effects, that the nibs were coated with oil when sold and this needs to be removed by sticking the nib into a potato before use, that the quick drying ink they were using could dry on the nib in five minutes. Much diligent writing followed as members practised their up and down strokes trying to apply an even pressure.

Everyone took away their own ink, pen, and letter guides to practice their writing at home.

We learned of botanical printing, preparing fabric with mordant, pressing flowers and leaves on, tightly rolling, tying, and steaming. A fish kettle is useful here. Then wash and dry in sunshine. Rust printing is simpler – dampen fabric with water and vinegar, plonk rusty objects onto fabric, and leave for a few days. Then admire your creativity!

This was an intriguing talk, with some inspiration for small projects. Though I expect we'll be sticking to blackcurrant jam and gooseberry chutney this year at least.




