After passing through airport style security, our first sight inside the Houses of Parliament was the vast, medieval Westminster Hall - where legal cases were heard and where Queen Elizabeth II (and previous monarchs) was laid in state.

We passed through halls bedecked with paintings, statues of former prime ministers and stained glass windows into the splendours of central lobby with its gold mosaic ceiling, royal statues and Post Office branch and up several floors to a Committee Room decorated in deep red flock Pugindesigned wallpaper.

We were there at the invitation of Stroud Green's MP, Catherine West, the MP for Hornsey and Wood Green and Shadow Foreign Minister (Asia and the Pacific). Catherine talked about how she had become an MP; going from working with refugees, to being a case worker in the House of Commons, a Labour councillor in Islington and Leader of Islington Council before becoming an MP in 2015.

Before meeting us, she had hosted a visit from members of the Youth Council and is working to encourage young people to engage with politics.

Members asked her what it was like working in the male-dominated and toxic culture of the Commons, the impact of MPs lying and people's high levels of distrust in politicians, how to encourage more women and girls into politics and what we could do to support female MPs.

As true WI ladies, we thanked Catherine with a basket of WI jams and a WI show the love seed bomb. Our visit culminated with a climb to the Strangers' Gallery to listen to a debate. Seated high above the green leather benches of the Commons, from which we were separated by floor-to-ceiling security glass, we were surprised at how small the chamber is in real life.

We spotted Yvette Cooper (Shadow Home Secretary) and Stella Creasy (MP for Walthamstow) among around 10 MPs still taking part at 9pm in a debate on the boring-sounding, but important, Investigatory Powers (Amendment) Bill [Lords] about how much access the secret services should be allowed to have to our communications and data.

At our February meeting, popular speaker Brian Greenan made a repeat visit to us, this time to talk about the high-profile Heinz Baby Food extortion case.

In his role as a Scotland Yard Detective, Brian was involved in solving this challenging case which took 3 years to solve, and which had a lasting influence on food preparation and packaging.

Although they try to release all wild animals, Pumpkin the fox would not be able to survive in the wild and

has become their 'mascot'. Some of the animals who have been treated at the Hospital include ducks, hedgehogs, foxes, red kites, and they have recently been able to release a peregrine falcon back into the wild. Peter Egan and Charles Dance are patrons of the hospital.

Much of our wildlife is threatened and we need to help where we can, plant wildflowers, make a hole in your fence for hedgehog highways, feed birds and provide water. For those who like to knit or crochet animals can be made and donated for sale at various open days run by the hospital.

Our members and committee brought in a selection of delicious Scones, cream, jam, fruit,

and Carrot cake to share; our charity pennies theme was 'Olive', won by Viv with a photo of Olive from *On the Buses*. Raffle prizes were won, books were swapped, (our book club is reading the Glass House by Eve Chase) and future events were planned. A very enjoyable evening.

I've watched it three times, and will watch it again and again—I love the songs and the pure escapism.


